

REPORT OF HIGHWAY SUPERINTENDENT

Most of the 1980 Highway money was spent for general maintenance of all roads such as scrapping, drainage, brush cutting, patching, etc.

The middle of March 1980 we started construction on Main Street. Drainage was put in, catch basins and manholes. The old road was dug out and gravel was put in; a bituminous concrete base was put on the gravel and then berms were put in.

A four foot sidewalk was put in with a grass strip for a distance of 1700 ft.

South Rd. was reconstructed for a distance of 700 ft. with drainage and catch basins and resurfaced with pea stone and asphalt.

In September we resurfaced Bennett Rd., Stafford Rd., Scantic Rd. 1/2 mile, North Rd. 1/2 mile and Mill Rd. 1/3 mile. The cemeteries, Baldwin Dr. and Ridgeway Road were resurfaced also.

Another project completed this year was a dike made on the west side of Mill Pond to control flooding behind the homes on the south side of Mill Road.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION ENTRY FOR THE 1981 TOWN REPORT

The Conservation Commission is continuing its efforts for updating Hampden's Master Plan. Because of cooperative work of Town Boards and townspeople, the Master Plan is near completion. Most communities use residents' tax revenues to contract with a consulting firm to undertake master plan work, but Hampden is accomplishing this through local input and assistance from other governmental agencies.

This plan will provide a comprehensive look at the future of Hampden and establish patterns for growth. Under the jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission, updating of the open space and recreation plan will enable Hampden to apply for federal and state funds to acquire land areas for conservation and public recreation. In conjunction, the Natural Resources Planning Program of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service will provide data necessary for acquiring funding assistance.

The Conservation Commission maintains active membership in the Massachusetts Association of Conservation Commissions (MACC), the Hampden County Division of MACC, and the Mass. Audubon Society.

The Commission is working to publish a second informational brochure describing some of the environmentally sensitive areas of Hampden. It will be distributed to all Town residents.

In December, 1980, the Commission sponsored a forestry meeting open to the public. Our Hampden County Forester spoke on forestry laws, best management practices and the gypsy moth. The meeting was well attended.

The main responsibility of the Conservation Commission is still the Wetlands Protection Act, Mass. General Laws 131, Section 40. This law is designed to protect the interests of people by protecting water supplies, guarding against flood and storm damage, and preventing pollution. In Hampden, where wetlands, or land abutting wet areas and rivers occupy nearly one fourth of our present land, it is particularly important to manage our water systems, these being a system of interconnected ground and surface water supplies.

If you wonder whether a project you plan to undertake in any area of Hampden is subject to the Wetlands Protection Act, contact the Commission. We can tell you if you will need to file a Notice of Intent. Beginning this process before undertaking work can eliminate unnecessary delays later.

Several new and energetic members have joined the Commission this year. Their fresh ideas are most welcome. We also welcome any questions, comments, or suggestions from residents in town. Feel free to call.

REPORT OF DOG OFFICER

During 1980, a total of 46 dogs were impounded, these dogs were all in violation of the restraining order and most of these dogs were all unlicensed. Of the 46 dogs impounded, 4 dogs were sold at \$5.00 each; 25 were redeemed by their owners at \$7.50 each; the remaining 17 were kept the required number of days and then destroyed at a cost to the Town of \$967.50

Reimbursement from the County amounted to \$374.00.

I caution all dog owners in Hampden that there is a restraining order in effect and all dogs are to be kept under control of owners at all times.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR 1980

During the year of 1980 the Hampden Fire Department responded to 62 calls.

Many of these fires were caused by faulty chimneys and improper installation of stove pipes. Because of the high cost of fuel, many people are installing wood burning stoves. We would again like to remind residents to inspect their chimneys and stove pipes, at least once a month, for a build up of soot or cracks in flue line or chimney masonry.

In 1980 the Hampden Voluntary Fire Department celebrated it's 50th Anniversary serving the Town of Hampden. It was celebrated with a chicken barbecue and a dedication ceremony and open house for the new addition to the fire station. We were very pleased to have eight honorary members, who helped to organize the Fire Department in November 1930, helping us celebrate. They were Harry Burns, George D. Fisher, Sr., Arthur Gerrish, Ben F. Libby, James P. Lyons, John C. Lyons, Chester Pease and Harlan P. Witkop. We also had Vern Thayer, our oldest living Past Fire Chief and honorary member, with us to cut the ribbon on the new additon.

The Hampden Fire Department was active in the Hampden County Mutual Aid Association. We assisted on three mutual aid calls to neighboring towns in 1980.

I would like to thank the Police and Highway Departments for their cooperation and assistance throughout the year.

SELECTMEN

In keeping with the dictates of our Annual Town Meeting of 1980, every attempt is being made to reduce the cost of our Annual Town Report, while maintaining the content required by law and the facts and figures that your Board of Selectmen feel is essential to you.

The major perturbation affecting our town during this report period was Proposition 2½; its effects and how to implement the legislation. Your Board of Selectmen are very pleased to report that the impact associated with this legislation was not as severe for our town as it was for many others. The experience from the 4% CAP from the previous two years, combined with our every effort to maintain limited spending was a major contributing factor to our good financial posture in dealing with Proposition 2½. A vote of thanks must go to all those departments responsible to the Board of Selectmen in committing to under-expend their budgets to comply with the new Proposition 2½. The statistics surrounding 2½ can be found in the report of the Advisory Committee.

Your Board has carried out all the requirements directed during the last Annual Town Meeting as required during this calendar report period, through December 31, 1980.

Many meetings were held in order to insure acceptable completion of the addition to the fire station, which culminated in the dedication last September. In addition, the reconstruction of Main Street was nearly completed, with the exception of the final coat, which will be applied, weather permitting, in early Spring, 1981.

Your Board of Selectmen is fulfilling its commitment to reduce perennial flooding of the lowland areas abutting the Scantic River. This is being done with minimal funds using Town labor and volunteer help from the Hampden Lions Club, Volunteer Fire Department, and other local interested citizens. All work is being done with the goal of reducing the flooding, while maintaining the aesthetic appeal of our most valuable natural resource. We owe thanks to many dedicated individuals on these projects, but in the interests of brevity, the thanks have to be general. The rebuilding of Flynt Dam in a period of two days epitomizes the dedication and interest of the following citizens and groups: Hampden Volunteer Fire Department for spearheading this effort; also Springfield Steel Erectors, Mr. Earl Harris, Jr.; Mr. Richard Harris, Hampden Lions Club, Hampden Conservation Commission and Hampden Historical Society; to name a few who were directly associated with this effort. While this is not only aesthetically pleasing, it provides recreation and also provides a nearby source of available water to be used by the Fire Department in the event of emergencies.

Activity will continue on general maintenance of the river in the area of Evergreen Terrace and Fox Run Lane, in order to provide relief to the river during high water times, eliminating the flooding in the area of Mohawk Drive and River Park Drive. Conservation hearings have been held and authorization received in this continued effort to save personal property from damage. While we have had some successes in reducing the overall flooding problem, we were unable to install a valve in the canal running to Mill Road. The Department of Environmental Quality Engineering in the final analysis, rejected plans for this installation.

Directed at the Annual Town Meeting and completed and installed was a new heating system for the Town House, with a goal of reducing energy usage. This task was completed by the end of December, 1980.

Cable TV installations have also been completed in accordance with the contract between the Town and Greater New England Cable TV. Worthy of note is the effort put forth by residents of Colony Drive and Bayberry Road and Genevieve Drive and Erica Circle and Fox Run Lane to take upon themselves individual contracts with both the cablevision company and a private construction company for cable TV service where none was originally planned because of underground utilities in those areas.

We were happy to note the completion and dedication of the Laughing Brook Educational facility last fall, and consider this an asset to our town and an inspiration to all town residents to maintain our natural and rural environment which prevails throughout the town.

The friendly community spirit of Hampden was very evident in events such as the lighting of the community Christmas tree, which was sponsored by the Hampden Business Association, and very well attended by our townspeople.

Your Board of Selectmen wish to take this opportunity to thank each and every resident of the town for their valued input; whether it be constructive criticism or praise. Without these suggestions and comments, the Selectmen would be relegated to an administrative function, instead of serving as an extension of the needs of our citizens, along with the leadership function implicit to our office.

1980 BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT

This has been a most active year for your Board of Health. Along with the normal flow of permits, inspections and plan reviews, many more questions were asked concerning local regulations and state codes. Activity of this type is welcomed, as it indicates an increasing awareness on the part of our fellow residents regarding health matters, which directly or indirectly affects us all.

A Flu Vaccine Clinic was held for Senior Citizens and over 100 residents participated.

Each month the Board meets formally with the Health Agent to review current and future activities, and as many times during the month as necessary to address specific inspections, designs and questions by townspeople.

The sanitary land fill is maintained under private contract and will be rebid this year. Through the efforts of the Board of Health and services of Tighe & Bond, we have maintained a very acceptable program at reasonable expense. Recycling of metal, glass and paper is a project carried out by the Hampden Scouts—with a net saving of space and expense to the taxpayers.

A strong effort has been made by Selectmen/Health with respect to litter. Generally roadside conditions are better and we will have the annual Spring cleanup again—date to be announced. The Board of Health may not regulate aesthetic conditions with respect to a private residence or business. If this condition becomes a health consideration, then action can be taken within the Board of Health Regulations.

The annual Rabies Clinic was held in the Spring and is always a good turnout by both person and dog.

The members of the Board of Health welcome your constructive comments and suggestions by our fellow townspeople. Our number is 566-3713 or call at our homes in the evening.

REPORT OF THE MODERATOR

The upcoming Annual Town Meeting will be unique and interesting. It will be the first time in the history of Town Meetings in Massachusetts where there will be a specific TOP LIMIT on local spending with no over-ride provisions.

Voters, by the passage of Proposition 2½ have already determined the maximum amount to be spent. In doing this many may feel this is sufficient and feel it unnecessary to attend Town Meetings. Nothing could be further from the truth; with a limited budget it becomes more important than ever that townspeople provide input to Elected and Appointed officials; only you should determine if more emphasis should be placed on Education, Police, Recreation, Highways or any of the many other items found in the onibus budget, you don't even have to spend up to the allowable limit.

I have often mentioned the success of Special Interest Groups at past Town Meetings. They are to be CONGRATULATED rather than CRITICIZED for their efforts. They spend many hours soliciting support for a cause to which they are dedicated. That is their obligation; you need spend only 6 to 8 hours per year to agree or disagree with their philosophy. Rest assured they will be out in force at the next Town Meeting to assure their fair share or more of the budget pie.

The Selectmen and Advisory Committee have and are spending endless hours with Department Heads, Boards and Committees in an attempt to arrive at a fair and equitable budget for all. They are to be commended for the responsible and positive approach to your mandate. However, conscientious as your Elected and Appointed Officials may be, we could still be wrong; REMEMBER for various reasons, most of us voted against Proposition 2½.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE AND SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The Hampden School Committee is pleased to present its report for the year 1980.

ENROLLMENT

The October 1, 1980 enrollment was 735 pupils. This is a decrease of sixty-four pupils from October 1, 1979. Projected enrollment at year end for the 1981-82 school year is 660. Projections indicate that the declining enrollment trend will continue through the early 1980's.

BASIC SKILLS

The State Department of Education approved the Basic Skills Improvement Plan that was developed by Hampden's Basic Skills Committee during the past two years. This Plan requires that pupils in Grades 2, 5, and 7 be tested in reading and math; pupils' writing skills will be tested in Grades 3, 5, and 7.

Pupils in Grades K-8 will continue to be administered the Iowa Test of Basic Skills. Parents will be given copies of test results.

NEEDS ASSESSMENT

A Needs Assessment was conducted by the School Committee which involved an assessment by the teachers and a random sampling of 25% of the parents of pupils (200 families) in the Hampden Public Schools. Areas of concern identified by the Needs Assessment were discipline, basic skills communication, health education, and staff meetings. Attention has been focused on each of these areas.

The Committee appreciates the cooperation given by all who participated in the assessment. The tabulated results of the Needs Assessment are available in the Principals' offices as public information.

CHAPTER 766

As of December 1, 1980, 121 students were receiving services under Chapter 766. 109 are involved in programs within the school system. Twelve students are in out-of-district placements; three of these placements are residential placements. In addition to these placements, there are presently five students who are involved in the pre-766 induction process.

The sum of \$253,763 has been budgeted for the Chapter 766 program for the 1980-81 school year.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE

Major maintenance projects completed at the Green Meadows School are the replacement of five wooden fire exit doors with insulated metal doors, the replacement of damaged ceiling tiles and repainting of a portion of the gymnasium, and the replacement of the defective water heater with a more energy efficient water heating system. The roof repair project has been completed at a final cost of \$70,605.

Work was completed on the repair of sections of the Thornton Burgess School parking lot. The repair of the Thornton Burgess School roof continues to be of major concern.

VOLUNTEERS

The Committee acknowledges with appreciation the volunteer services provided by Hampden residents. These school volunteers have given very generously of their time and talents in giving their support to the education of Hampden's students. For all their contributions, the Committee extends a sincere thank you.

OUTLOOK

Nineteen-Eighty from a School Committee perspective was dominated by two major issues. First was the matter of continuing decline in enrollment. The second was the mandate relative to municipal finance that was enacted by the electorate in November. Individually, each issue is a formidable challenge. In combination they create a complexity of factors that are certain to alter public education in the Town of Hampden.

The School Committee acknowledges its responsibilities in this regard. It intends to address these matters with diligence and an understanding of purpose that will insure the integrity of the educational system and respect the will of the voters. The Committee solicits community interest, understanding and support in this process.

IN APPRECIATION

The Committee recognizes the advice and assistance provided by the Board of Selectmen, the Advisory Committee, the Police Department, the Highway Department, the several other town departments, and the residents of Hampden. For this support, the Committee is very grateful.

HAMPDEN-WILBRAHAM REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

The passage of Proposition 2½ presents a unique and demanding challenge for the Regional School Committee.

The Regional School District must meet its share of the separate tax levy reductions of the two communities, as mandated by Proposition 2½, while retaining the 70%-30% assessment relationship required by the Regional School District Agreement. The resolution of these complex requirements will be the major concern of your school committee over the next several months.

Many of the ramifications and consequences of this legislation are as yet undetermined. Specifics of the law are being studied by the Legislature and the legality of certain provisions is being challenged in the Courts. Information will be supplied to the residents of the district as issues are clarified by the Legislature and the Courts.

In the interest of economy, the reports of the various departments of the high school will be omitted this year from the town report. However, this information will be placed in the Public Libraries of the towns of Hampden and Wilbraham.
